BIDDING FOR EDUCATION: A TRADITION OF SUPPORT

Over 200 community members came together recently for the CCIS Service Auction, a triennial event that has grown since its first auction in 1991. The lively evening featured 68 live auctions, with "Sean's Guided Gopher Hunt" bringing in the highest bid at \$3,100. A total of \$79,133 was brought in between the live auction and other auctions & donations.

The CCIS Service Auction is more than a fundraising event — it's a testament to the enduring spirit and generosity of the Cartwright-Roblin community. While only Grade 12 at CCIS is officially independent, the CCIS Board funds the equivalent of 1.375 teaching positions, which benefits all grades by preventing quad or triple-grade classrooms. Current government funding fluctuates annually based on the size of the Grade 12 class, but school expenses remain consistent, leaving a gap that must be filled through donations and community fundraising.

or the 2025/26 school year, the operating budget is approximately

\$98,000, with estimated government funding of \$43,000, leaving a shortfall of \$55,000 to be raised through generosity like yours.

Because of this fundraising, students in our community have the opportunity to complete Grade 12 right here at home—surrounded by their families, supported by familiar faces, and connected to the place they're proud to call home.

From the students, staff, and board of CCIS — thank you for your ongoing support and for helping make this school a cornerstone of our community for over three decades.





ANNUAL REPORT

Cartwright and Area Foundation

Our board of seven members met four times this past year. Carolyn Schram - chair Maggie Hayward - treasurer Vicki Wallace - secretary Tom Mowbray - vice chair Kim Clark - member at large Drew Haight - member at large Denise Wallace - member at large The 2024 Endow MB Giving Challenge was very

successful with \$10,699 raised plus the full \$4000 stretch added for a total of \$14,699.

At our 2024 annual meeting Oct. 28, the Mather playground group, the Cartwright Golf Club, Cartwright-Roblin His- had a display at a senior luncheon at the hall in April to celebrate torical Society, and Badger Creek Playground shared their updates on foundation grants.

In October, Endow MB made program changes and established membership criteria for Manitoba foundations. We signed an agreement to adhere to the criteria which makes us eligible to receive funds from the Thomas Sill Foundation. The requirements include meeting four times per year, maintaining good business practices. and reviewing and creating policies.

At our Feb. 5, 2025 meeting we reviewed some existing policies and approved new policies for Code of Conduct, Confidentiality and Privacy, and Conflict of Interest.

We decided to retain our membership with the Canadian Foundation as it has been financially beneficial.

On March 26, we held a regular meeting which involved a zoom presentation from Kevin Parsons of Endow

MB, on our sustainable funding model. On May 8, Maggie and Kim attended a regional meeting at Deloraine on creating

community awareness of a foundation. Our annual granting meeting was held on May 15. We had received a donation allowing us to increase the existing CCIS scholarship. Grant applications were shared and discussed. We received \$22,903 from the Thomas Sill foundation to grant, as well as \$10,000 from the Canadian Foundation admin funds. We passed a motion to grant \$59,200, plus designated fund amount of \$8327. We granted \$5290 for scholarships, for a total of \$72,817, a

As of August, 2025, our investments with the Winnipeg Foundation were \$1,135,194.

Contributed capital for 2024 was \$21,369 with a cumulative total of \$778,953.


