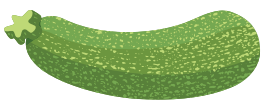

 Belgian bowling—also called Rolle Bolle—uses curved balls designed to roll in an arc instead of straight! The goal isn’t to knock pins down, but to land your ball closest to a stake or feather target. It’s a centuries-old Belgian tradition that’s still alive today in small towns across North America.

FOUNDATION LOOKS FORWARD TO GIVING CHALLENGE

Summer is a quiet time for the Cartwright and Area Foundation board, with the exception of the Ponderosa Parade. Thank you to Tom, Denise, Carolyn and Maggie for working the parade.

The Cartwright and Area Foundation was incorporated in 1981 as an initiative put forward by the local Kinsmen Club, with a volunteer board of seven. All donated funds are in a perpetual endowment fund with The Winnipeg Foundation. The income earned from these investments is granted out annually.

The aim of the Cartwright and Area Foundation is to help strengthen community well-being now, and in the future, while respecting the wishes of donors. This is accomplished by supporting community projects and organizations which are meeting community needs.

Over the past forty-five years, many families have named the local foundation as a place to direct donations in memory of their loved ones. The foundation board appreciates the trust shown by families and our community.

Manitoba community foundation funds have been enhanced with help through the Endow Manitoba Giving Challenge over the past 11 years. This challenge sees the Winnipeg Foundation, and the Manitoba government (since 2017) each contributing funds according to the amount donated during the challenge period. Over the last eight years, local donations in this time hit at least \$10,000 and triggered \$4000 in extra funding six times. What a tremendous response and result! Over these eight years, the extra funding totals \$30,732.

Watch for more information early in November to get in on this year's challenge.

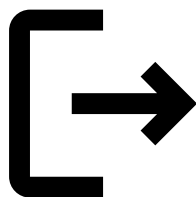

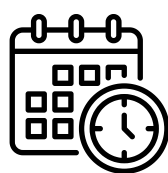

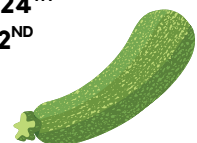

TWINS 2025 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

The 2025 baseball season ended up being another memorable campaign for the Cartwright Twins. This season’s roster consisted of 16 players: Finlay Dobbeleare, Connor Drewry, Bryce Enns, Ty Enns, Drew Haight, Kieran Haight, Wade Haight, Greg Hockin, Matt Johnston, Nik Kummer, Wyatt Livingstone, Andrew Lochhead, Cody Milliken, Von Mullin, Justin Odium, and Nick Riglin. Once again playing in the west division of the Border Baseball League, the Twins won the regular season pennant by finishing first place with a 12 - 2 record.

The Twins opened the playoffs by winning a tightly contested best of five series with Clearwater 3-0. The second round was much of the same with the Twins completing a second hard fought sweep over Pilot Mound. In the league finals, the Twins clawed back from a 2-0 series deficit by winning game 3, but ultimately couldn’t defend their title as 2024 Border League champions as they lost to a strong Morden Mudhens team 3-1 in the series.

By making the league finals, the Twins qualified for AA Provincials in Elmwood (Winnipeg). After finishing the round robin 2-1 and beating Brandon 1-0 in walk-off fashion in the semi-final, the Twins faced an unfortunately familiar fate by losing to Boissevain 8-7 in the provincial final – marking back to back seasons as provincial finalists.

Following Provincials and the Border League finals, the Twins had one more tournament as their 2024 finish as a provincial finalist led to a wildcard berth at the Senior AA Western Canadian Baseball Championship in Westlock, AB. The Twins once again ended with a 2-1 round robin record, and then beat the Carlyle Cardinals 11-0 in a semi-final matchup. In the finals this time, the tables finally turned with the Cartwright Twins being crowned Western Canadian champs beating the West Winnipeg A’s 4-2.

As a team, we would like to take this opportunity to thank our fans and the entire community. No matter where we end up playing, we haven’t encountered a senior baseball team with the support that we receive. Our trip to westerns - and our team’s continued existence - wouldn’t be possible without that support and we’re looking forward to seeing everyone at Waldie Field again next season!

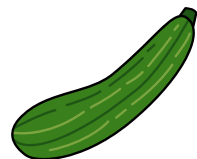

What is a steering committee, and what does it do?

When starting a co-op, one of the first things you should do is form a steering committee. A steering committee is the group of people that do the work of forming a co-op. For example, a steering committee outlines how decisions are made. Often it completes and submits government forms. And some key steering committee activities include figuring out how to finance the business, finding members, and much more. Sometimes a steering committee does the legwork on behalf of a larger group of people, but more often this group represents the core of the co-op.

What a Steering Committee does

Here is a list of activities often completed by a steering committee:

- Get organized
- Determine the co-op’s purpose
- Assign tasks
- Gather broader support (if needed)
- Follow an action plan towards **incorporating** and launching the business.

Of course, there are many ways of accomplishing the same objectives. So, treat the above as a guide, not a comprehensive list.

Because this group organizes itself and the co-op, a steering committee often outlines the governance of the new organization. So, a steering committee is also like a board of directors. In fact, this committee often becomes the first board of directors once the co-op is incorporated — at least until the first AGM when the members elect a new board. 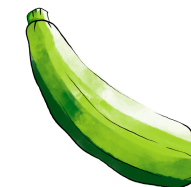
